A Matter of Life and Death

Life.. As you think about the next couple of months of summer with jammed calendars of fun, I want you to ponder a couple of questions that may seem trivial or downright silly to think about now that life is experiencing fun times. Yet, there is a serious note to our lives, and I want you think about, to ponder as you sit by the campfire or drift lazily down the river with baited hook dangling in the water. It is a question that many of us don't want to imagine or even dwell on, we don't want to spoil the party so to speak. The questions revolve around life, not just life in the general sense, but your life in the specific.

Do you view life as something that is filled with the seriousness of work and the fun and frolic of life, not worrying about anything? Or do you view your life as having enough time to provide for your family and enjoy those times at the campsite or the fishing hole or even at the kids and grandkids ball games? Or maybe you are planning the future of maybe taking a cruise, like we just completed, or experiencing the great outdoors before the cold winds of fall and winter return? I really want you to ponder, think about preparing for the last great moments of your life.

Life...I just did want I wasn't going to do, spoil the party. Oh well, there is nothing left but to get on with what I want to tell you about. The matter that I want you to think about is where will you spend eternity after this life is over with. Oh, you could come back to me with all the evidence that you are taking care of the body that God blessed you with to enjoy life, eating the right foods, getting enough exercise, and oh yes, getting all the sleep that is necessary to live. Yet, there is something very serious I want you to think about, that is about your spiritual, faith life. Remember what the Apostle Paul wrote in the sixth chapter of his Epistle to the Romans: "For the wages of sin is death," (Romans 6:23) We are going to die, there is no way getting around it, death will suck the lifeblood from our physical body. Yet that is not the end of the story of our lives, is it?

Death...indeed comes to all of us, whether it is by way of heart attack, cancer, car accident, or by any other means, eventually we will all die. So, why all of sudden am I writing about that morbid, never really talk about, always pushing away, not really wanting to discuss the end of our lives story. The reason is that on Friday, May 31st Karen and I ventured to Duluth for a Memorial Service for a cousin of mine that I haven't seen in years. Mark died of cancer in mid-May and his celebration of life was held on that last day of the month of May. The service was held at a church named The Landing, a 67, yet a believer in Jesus Christ. Mark was an individual who was a child of God, yet one who could have been mad at God for allowing his first wife to die so young, left to raise his two children on his own, and a man who strayed away from God. But God didn't leave him alone and was not through with Mark. God did an amazing thing in Mark's life, for he sent an instrument of his to tell Mark about the greatest news he was to hear, about the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and the fantastic news of life eternal that all who believe in Jesus have at the end of this physical life. Physical death would invade Mark's life and family, but more importantly the Good News is that Mark has never ending life with Jesus and all the company of heaven. What great news for Mark and for you as well, Jesus' resurrection gives all who believe in Him eternal life.

*Life...*is what we celebrate, at the beginning when a baby is born, when that child of God is baptized and brought into the Lord's kingdom, and at the end of life when that baptized, believing child of God dies a physical death. For when we die our life does not end in a dark hole but in the glories of God's heavenly

mansions. What a celebration that will be for all those who believe in the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. This is the news that we need to share with those around us, those we meet in our daily lives, those who need the Lord Jesus Christ, so all who believe in Jesus have eternal life. Paul writes:

"but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom. 6:23) The Lord's peace!

Newsletter Article – July 2024 --- <u>The Rewards of Godliness</u>

It's no secret that you can't bribe your way into heaven. No amount of good works will impress God enough to open heaven's door for their sake. "For the wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23) and the person who "keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become guilty of all of it" (James 2:10). Rather, salvation is "the free gift of God ... in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:23).

So, your good works won't earn you the reward of heaven. But does that mean that there are no rewards at all? Consider what the Small Catechism says in the "Close of the Commandments":

What does God say about all these commandments?

He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." (Ex. 20:5–6)

What does this mean?

God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands. (SC II)

God promises to bless you in keeping His commandments. What might these blessings be? Well, consider what Paul says about keeping the Fourth Commandment: "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 'Honor your father and mother' (this is the first commandment with a promise), 'that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land'" (Eph. 6:1–3).

And think about what your life would be like if you went around stealing (breaking the Seventh Commandment), telling lies about people (breaking the Eighth Commandment), and generally being cruel to those around you (breaking all the commandments!). That is obviously not a blessed way to live. In fact, you'd be miserable living that way.

And Jesus says more about what is in store for those who make sacrifices for His sake: "Jesus said to them, 'Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of Man will sit on His glorious throne, you who have followed Me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands, for My name's sake, will receive a hundredfold and will inherit eternal life" (Matt. 19:28–29). So don't grow impatient in doing good. Follow the Lord who has freely given you everlasting life.




