Be Not Afraid!

Fear...is different for each and every individual. For some the fear of heights makes the heart beat faster, the palms get sweaty, and the knees shake. For some others it may be the fear of flying, of someone else is in control, feeling the plane shaking as it ascends above the clouds, or even the screeching of the brakes as it is landing. For still others there is fear and anxiety when the doctor quietly speaks the dreaded diagnosis of cancer. Yet, our Lord comes to us in His Word and speaks personally to us: "**Fear Not...**"

Fear....can easily grip the life of an individual when reading about the highs and lows of the stock market, watching gas prices jump all over the place, purchasing food to eat, attempting to keep up with the rent or mortgage of the shelter we need. There are so many different things that can and do cause fear to lodge in a person's life. When the nightly news blares out the killing of another individual by gun fire or when a vehicle plows through a crowd of people with one dead and many injured, one is filled with fear and anxiety. Yet, our Lord comes to us in His Word, "**Fear Not...**"

Fear...is something that our Lord was accustomed to from His disciples, His close personal friends. There were those times when the disciples showed, exhibited fear and anxiety in their lives; when Jesus was walking on water, when he fed the 5,000, when he raised Lazarus from the dead, when he changed water into wine, among so many other times. Yet, the Lord Jesus instructed them not to fear, not to have anxiety rule their hearts and lives, but to believe. Jesus told his disciples in the upper room of the many rooms that awaited for them and the peace that comforts them in their struggles of faith, their confusion over what will happen to him, saying words of comfort: "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart, I have overcome the world." (John 16:33) Take heart, brothers and sisters in the faith, the Lord has overcome the world, our fears, our anxieties, our worries, when He tells us: "Fear Not..."

Fear...is ultimately taken away from our lives and replaced by the peace and hope that our precious Lord Jesus gives to us in His life, suffering, death, and resurrection. That is what our Lord wants us to hear and understand as we hear rumors of wars, as we are made aware of the evil that plaques mankind, as we hear about the violence that has been unleashed people all over the world, as we experience all different types of suffering we are made aware of the Lord's presence and peace: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you, I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let our hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." (John 14:27). Take time to read the Lord's Word, take time to pray for one another, take time to help and encourage one another in these dangerous times, above all take time to forgive one another and to love each other. The Lord's gracious peace be with you.

"The Singing Church"

Lutherans have historically been called "the singing church." There is no doubt that music has been a major component in the theology and practice of the Lutheran church. Luther once remarked about music, "We can mention only one point, namely, that next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise." Music has a power and purpose that cannot be understated in our worship and the life of the congregation.

But music does more than touch the emotions. Music is a vehicle that carries both the musician and the hearer deeper into connection with the truth of the Scriptures. This is true of the most complex Bach chorale and even the simplest of songs like "Jesus Loves Me, This I Know." Each musical selection within the church shapes the thoughts, minds and faith of the people who experience them.

This is also true of stewardship hymns. We are currently considering the verses of "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788) as it shapes our understanding and practice of stewardship. This month we take a deeper dive into verse two:

Teach us to thank you, Lord, for love and grace

For life and vision, for a purpose clear,

For Christ Your Son, and for each human face

that shows Your message ever new and near.

The stanza begins by touching on the truth of the Law. Thankfulness is not a natural posture for fallen humanity. For sinners curved in upon themselves, thankfulness for love and grace is something that must be taught. We are those who hoard and clutch. Our confession of our shallow thankfulness highlights the need for us to learn thankfulness to God.

Thankfulness also points to what we are stewards of: love and grace! All the things we have traditionally called stewardship aren't actual stewardship. Rather, what matters is how we steward the one, true and only treasure: the love and grace of God revealed to us in the Gospel of


Jesus Christ. So, all stewardship is stewardship of the Gospel! How can we gaze at the cross and empty tomb and not be thankful?

The LCMS defines stewardship as "the free and joyous activity of God's family — the church — in managing life's resources for His purposes." God's love and mercy give us a clear purpose as we live out our Baptism and practice this joyous stewardship. All we are, all we have entrusted to us, and all we are called to do is to connect others with the love and mercy of God revealed in Jesus!

The faithful steward sings with lips and life of this love and mercy that is ever new and near. In the Scriptures. In the Lord's House. At the Lord's Table. This is where our stewardship song starts and ends. Our family, our co-workers and classmates, and our world need to hear this song!

The LCMS has released what they call "<u>The Lutheran Citizenship Guide</u>." This is a document that used to be called the <u>"Lutheran Voter Guide</u>." They mention that they are broadening the focus of their comments and guidance this year. No longer restricting their discussion to specific political issues or specific pieces of legislation, they will instead be offering thoughts regarding the attitudes and approaches that Lutheran Christians might consider as they seek to be faithful in serving their neighbor through the exercise of citizenship.

Fun Facts about the Octopus!!!



- 1. Octopuses can use tools and solve problems. Octopuses, or octopi, are incredibly intelligent animals with large brains and advanced cognitive capabilities.
- 2. There are around 300 Octopus species in the world.
- 3. Octopuses have three hearts.
- **4. They have nine brains;** In addition to the central brain, each of their eight arms possesses a mini-brain. Octopus neurons, are distributed between their central and eight peripheral brains, enabling their arms to perform complex tasks independently.
- 5. Octopuses have blue blood.
- 6. Octopuses can change color and texture.
- 7. Octopuses release ink clouds that can confuse predators.
- **8.** Octopuses can regenerate lost limbs within months; when an octopus loses a tentacle, a complex biological process begins; within only a few months, the process completes and produces an entirely regrown limb.
- 9. Octopuses are mostly solitary.
- 10. Octopuses can also breathe through their skin; known as cutaneous respiration.
- 11. The Giant Pacific Octopus is the largest species in the world; weighing an incredible 150 lbs. and having an arm span of 30 feet.
- **12.** The blue-ringed octopus is one of the most venomous creatures in the world they carry the extremely potent tetrodotoxin, a neurotoxin that is 1,200 times more potent than cyanide.
